FOUNDATION DAY- 5TH JULY

COLLEGE AT A GLANCE

1st Foundation Day Celebration of Wangkhao Government College on 5th July 1984.

The present Wangkhao Government College Mon, initially a private college known and inaugurated as Mon Arts College, had its first Inaugural Function on 5th July 1983 at Mon Government High School premises with the Principal of the College, Mr. N V George serving notice to the students to attend the Inaugural meeting. The State Education Minister Mr. Nocklem was the Chief Guest of the Programme.

The setting up of Arts College Mon, now called Wangkhao Government College, was the fulfilment of a long-felt desire of the people of Mon district as a whole and the entire Konyak community in particular. The establishment of this college was spearheaded by the then Konyak Students' Conference (KSC), now the Konyak Students' Union (KSU), through a resolution adopted in their annual conference in the late nineteen seventies.

Currently, the college offers Degree Course in Arts with Honours in English, Education, History, Political Science and Economics.

The college is NAAC assessed with a grade of B+ and CGPA of 2.55.

The distance between Deputy Commissioner's Office, Mon and Wangkhao Government College is 4.5 km.

The distance between Deputy Commissioner's Office, Mon and Bhojo (BOJ) Railway Station near Sonari is 60km

CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

As part of the Human Resource Development initiative toward New Education Policy 2020, the University Grants Commission (UGC) has developed a comprehensive and broad-based Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) to be uniformly implemented by all Higher Education Institutions across the country at the Undergraduate and Post Graduate level. This system offers opportunities to explore additional avenues of learning for holistic development while pursuing specialization in the chosen subject of studies.

The Choice Based Credit System will be implemented at the institution from the 2022-2023 Academic Session onwards with B.A. Honours Programme in English, Education, Economics, History and Political Science.

OUTLINE OF CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM

- 1. **CORE COURSE**: These Courses are to be compulsorily studied as a core requirement for the programme. The contents of the Core Courses shall be as per the UGC Model Curriculum for the subject/ discipline concerned. The papers under this category are going to be taught uniformly across all the colleges under Nagaland University.
- 2. ELECTIVE COURSE: Generally, a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course. There are two types of Elective courses under CBCS. These courses may be intradepartmental, i.e. Discipline Specific Elective (DSEC) as well as inter-departmental, i.e., Generic Elective (GE). For the students of the same discipline/ subjects, these elective courses shall be intra-disciplinary and shall be called DSE Courses. If the students of other discipline/ subjects (within the Programme) opt these electives shall be considered as interdisciplinary and shall be called GE courses.
- 3. **DISCIPLINE SPECEFIC ELECTIVE (DSEC) COURSE**: Elective courses offered under the main discipline/subject of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Elective.
- 4. **GENERIC ELECTIVE (GE) COURSE**: An elective course chosen from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline/s of choice is called a Generic Elective. The purpose of this category of papers is to offer the students the option to explore disciplines of interest beyond the choices they make in Core and Discipline Specific Elective papers. A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by other discipline/subject and vice versa and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Elective.

Students are advised to choose Generic Elective papers from other subjects in such a way that the knowledge gained from the generic elective papers enriches the study of the Core Honours course of the student.

- 5. **ABILITY ENHANCEMENT COMPULSORY COURSE (AECC)**: "AECC" courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement;
 - i. Environmental Science
 - ii. English.

These are mandatory for all disciplines.

6. **SKILL ENHANCEMENT COURSE (SEC)**: SEC courses are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc.

GUIDELINES ON COURSE OF STUDY, SEMESTER SYSTEM & EXAMINATION

- 1. Degree course must be completed within a period of minimum 3 years.
- 2. The duration of odd semester I, III & V shall start from May to Oct (06 months).
- 3. The duration of even semester II, IV &VI shall start from Nov to April (06 months).

(Guidelines 1-3 are subject to Nagaland University Notification)

4. Under the Nagaland University notification 2012, each semester will be followed by End Semester Examination which is conducted by the university.

CONDUCT OF EXAMINATION

All End Semester Examination question papers are prepared by the Nagaland University.

A. EXAMINATION ROUTINE

All examination routines will be duly notified by the university on their website.

B. STUDENTS ASSESSMENT AND PROGRESSION

The performance of a student shall be evaluated on a 30:70 basis i,e. 30 marks for Internal Assessment and 70 marks for End Semester Examination.

C. PASS MARKS

In order to qualify for End Semester Examination, a student must secure a minimum of 45% of marks in the internal assessment i.e, 13.5 marks and 45% of marks in the end semester examination i,e. 31.5 marks respectively.

D. Activities for Internal Assessment

The Internal Assessment for 30 marks shall be conducted in any of the following three manner:

- i. Class test
- ii. Assignments
- iii. Seminar
- iv. Quiz
- v. Group discussions
- vi. Project work
- vii. Presentation
- viii. Other relevant activities

RULES & REGULATION

- 1. 75% attendance in each paper is mandatory for all students to fill end term examination forms.
- Irregular attendance, indifference in regard to class work and examination, discourtesy towards
 teachers, insubordination, obscenity in words and behaviour, wilful damages to college property,
 anti-social activities etc. are liable for disciplinary action which includes expulsion from the
 college.

- 3. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class; late comers shall enter class room with permission of the teacher.
- 4. Impersonation at roll call will be considered serious offence.
- 5. It is the responsibility of parents and guardians to find out from the department concerned the attendance score of their ward(s) from time to time
- 6. Every student shall handle college property with care and shall do everything in power to preserve cleanliness and tidiness of the furniture, building and the premises. Students shall not disfigure the walls, doors, windows, furniture etc. with spit, bills engravings etc. Furthermore, the cost of any damage, if caused to college property will be charged to the account of the students responsible for the damage in addition to disciplinary action.
- 7. Students are expected to take active part in extra and co-curricular activities like games & sports, literary, cultural, national social scheme, red ribbon club. Evangelical Union, Eco Club, Nasha Mukt Abhiyan, Fitness Club, Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat etc. and any other activities undertaken by the college.
- 8. Students are required to wear uniforms on all days except on Wednesday & Saturday.
- 9. Students must exhibit discipline in dress, language and behaviour.
- 10. Students are expected to support the College in keeping the College-Tobacco-Free Zone, Eco-Friendly and Plastic Free Campus.
- 11. Rioting/agitation against another group of students or any reason whatsoever is prohibited.
- 12. Ragging/teasing/intimidating/harassing/using words of abuse etc. on junior students and opposite sex are punishable under the law.
- 13. Use of mobile phones in the class is strictly prohibited.
- 14. In all matters not specified in the forgoing rule, students shall aim at conducting themselves respecting the right of others so as to establish and maintain good tradition and reputation of the institution.
- 15. Any further rule and regulation framed by the College from time to time shall be binding to all.

FACILITIES

- 1. Clean and safe drinking water facility is available in the college building.
- 2. College buses ply daily between the town and the college campus on all working days.
- 3. The college has a library with reading room/computer facility for students, staff as well as faculty. Students are to make use of the library facilities for their academic benefits.
- 4. First aid is available in the Academic Building. Medical Inspection (MI) room is available.
- 5. Games and sports facilities such as football, badminton court, basketball court, table tennis board, volleyball, and carom are available for the students in the college.
- 6. Canteen/cafeteria is available in the college.
- 7. College has an auditorium for various activities of the college.
- 8. Common room facilities for male/female students are available.
- 9. Diploma Courses are available in IGNOU Centre at Wangkhao Government College.
- 10. Two class representatives shall be elected from each class. Only those students having minimum attendance percentage of 75% shall be qualified for contesting in the CR election. The responsibilities of the CRs are to assist the teachers in maintaining discipline in the class, and also initiate among the mates in keeping the classrooms clean and tidy, stain-free etc.

LIBRARY RULES

- 1. Library card is mandatory for access to the library.
- 2. A member shall be allowed to borrow 2 books per card for a week.
- 3. Late fine will be collected if the book is not retuned after the due date.
- 4. Librarian may ask to return any book from any member at any time and the member shall return the book soon.
- 5. If books are lost, the borrower shall replace the books of the same edition or latest edition or pay double price of the book after getting permission from the librarian.
- 6. If the card is lost, it should be reported to the librarian and duplicate card will be issued against formal application and fine.
- 7. The card is valid till the end of the course and must be duly surrendered.
- 8. No Due Certificate should be obtained by each student after returning the books issued, surrendering the borrower's card and outstanding dues if any
